


Toronto Pearson wins awards in 2010

Toronto Pearson is proud of the recognition we received from the aviation industry during 2010. The awards show that the airport is on the right track to becoming North America's premier portal to a world of possibilities.

We won the International Air Transport
Association's Eagle Award for Most Improved
Airport, recognizing the significant strides we
have made in working with the air carrier
industry. We won five Airport Revenue News
awards based on feedback from airport retailers,
including Best Customer Service, Best
Concessions Management Team, and Best Overall
Concessions Program. We won the Travel Press
Agent's Choice Award as favourite Canadian
airport, the second year in a row.

Air Services

Air Canada will add more than 450,000 seats to and from Toronto Pearson this summer through its continuing international expansion strategy, including:

- Santiago/Buenos Aires, daily, starting May 2
- Madrid, daily, starting June 8
- Copenhagen, daily, starting June 15
- Dublin, daily, Starting June 29
- Barcelona, six times weekly, starting June 30
- Athens, four times weekly, starting July 1

WestJet launched new direct service to Palm Springs, Calif., in February, flying twice weekly with a Boeing 737-700.



In addition, WestJet now operates the following routes year-round:

- New Orleans, four times weekly
- Bermuda, three times weekly
- Puerto Vallarta, Mexico, weekly
- El Catey/Samana, Dominican Republic, weekly

In April, both **LAN Airlines** and **Virgin America** will unfortunately cease operations at Toronto.

During the summer season, **Aerosvit** will increase Kiev service to three times weekly using a Boeing 767-300, while **KLM** will increase Amsterdam service to 13 times weekly using either an Airbus 330-300 or a Boeing 777-200.

EGYPTAIR &

On June 1, Star Alliance carrier **EgyptAir** launches new, non-stop service to Cairo four times weekly using a Boeing 777.

Also on June 1, **Icelandair** increases its capacity on existing Reykjavik service four times weekly using a larger Boeing 757-300, an increase of 200 seats per week.



On June 16, **Copa Airlines** becomes our newest carrier when it launches non-stop service to Panama City, Panama, four times weekly with a Boeing 737-700.


This exhibition is on display in Terminal 1, International Departures, until March 2011.

In Weather Girl: an investigation into the elements of weather played out in 2 parts, Toronto artist Tara Cooper worked from an account of a lightning strike survivor. Missy became the fictitious "Weather Girl" whose story is told through text, original artist prints, a hand-built weather station and various weather equipment, vintage books and paraphernalia.


Cooper's images are inspired by true stories of encounters with lightning and also depict cloud formations, rain drops and lightning. Each element is printed by hand and pinned to the gallery wall to create a composition.

Noise Complaints and Callers




Top Five Callers vs. All Other Callers in 2010

Restricted Hours Flights (November 2009–October 2010)





Early Turn Trials

The trial program allowing early turns on the north/south runways and extended prop turn hours continues, and related complaints are minimal.

Throughout the trial from March 3, 2008, to December 31, 2010, 1,579 eligible jet aircraft (22 per cent) conducted an early turn off the north/south runways, resulting in six complaints. During this time, 1,798 props (94 per cent) conducted early turns between the hours of 6:30 and 6:59 a.m., while 2,064 (85 per cent) initiated early turns between 11:01 and 11:30 p.m., resulting in 25 complaints.




Comparison of Aircraft Movements and Noise Complaints by Runway Operation

Throughout 2010, there were 416,644 aircraft movements at Toronto Pearson, resulting in 1,245 complaints, of which 479 were related to aircraft arrivals, and 729 were related to aircraft departures. In addition, 37 complaints were received that were unrelated to runway operation.
